SB 411 Updates: If a Neighborhood Council has a quorum of board members in a physical location, board members who wish to join the meeting via teleconferencing must adhere to AB 2449 rules and regulations. If a Neighborhood Council does not have a quorum of board members in a physical location, they must adhere to SB 411 rules and regulations. In the event of a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting to members of the public using the call-in option or internet-based service option, or in the event of a disruption within the eligible legislative body's control that prevents members of the public from offering public comments using the call-in option or internet-based service option, the eligible legislative body shall take no further action on items appearing on the meeting agenda until public access to the meeting via the call-in option or internet-based service option is restored. Actions taken on agenda items during a disruption that prevents the eligible legislative body from broadcasting the meeting may be challenged pursuant to Section 54960.1. The eligible legislative body shall not require public comments to be submitted in advance of the meeting and shall provide an opportunity for the public to address the legislative body and offer comments in real time. Notwithstanding Section 54953.3, an individual desiring to provide public comment through the use of an internet website, or other online platform, not under the control of the eligible legislative body, that requires registration to log in to a teleconference may be required to register as required by the third-party internet website or online platform to participate. (i) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed public comment period for each agenda item shall not close the public comment period for the agenda item, or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph, o provide public comment until that timed public comment period has elapsed. (ii) An eligible legislative body that does not provide a timed public comment period, but takes public comment separately on each agenda item, shall allow a reasonable amount of time per agenda item to allow public members the opportunity to provide public comment, including time for members of the public to register pursuant to subparagraph (D), or otherwise be recognized for the purpose of providing public comment. (iii) An eligible legislative body that provides a timed general public comment period that does not correspond to a specific agenda item shall not close the public comment period or the opportunity to register, pursuant to subparagraph (D), until the timed general public comment period has elapsed.

<u>Public Input</u>: Comments from the public on agenda items will be heard only when the respective item is being considered. Comments from the public on other matters not appearing on the agenda that are within the Board's jurisdiction will be heard during the General Public Comment period. Please note that under the Brown Act, the Board is prevented from acting on a matter that you bring to its attention during the General Public Comment period; however, an issue raised by a member of the public may become the subject of a future Board meeting. Public comment is limited to two minutes per speaker, unless adjusted by the presiding officer of the committee.

Executive Officers.

My name is Bill Burton, and I have been a resident of the 24000 block of Gilmore Street (West Hills/91307) for the last nine years. I'd like to thank you all for your dedication and hard work for our community.

I'm reaching out today to raise a concern that I hope we can all work to resolve together. Our three-block run of Gilmore Street has become deeply impacted & endangered by drivers speeding well above the speed limit and running through stop signs. I am a Captain of a Gilmore Neighborhood Watch group, and this is a constant concern for our community. Parents are afraid to let their kids play in their front yard, in case one of these speeding cars loses control. We've had several near-misses with people out on evening walks (*They walk in the street because the sidewalks are terrible, but that's a different conversation*).

Our three blocks of Gilmore Street are uniquely situated near Victory Blvd & Valley Circle Blvd (Photo attached). It is a long straight road, away from the eyes of any cruising police cars, where drivers feel safe to break the law and drive recklessly at extreme speeds. Our stop signs are constantly ignored. Because of the easy access to Victory and/or Valley Circle, drivers come in and rip down our street, and can then make a quick exit onto a major road and be gone. This is the same reason we get a lot of vehicles broken into on our street. The ability to drive at extreme speeds down our straight street gives them a good exit strategy if/when a citizen catches them attempting to break into a vehicle (*This has happened multiple times already this year*).

We are in desperate need of speed humps to end these dangerous conditions. I know the application for 2024 is closed, and that the 2025 applications won't open until October. But is there anything that can be done in the meantime? Before someone is seriously hurt, or worse?

I appreciate you taking the time to read this. Please let me know that you've received this email, and how we can best work together to solve this dangerous issue on Gilmore Street.

I've CC'd my Neighborhood Watch Co-Captain, Loren Rose, to make sure this conversation doesn't end here, and that you all receive swift responses to any follow-up questions
